CHARACTERISTICS

Height: 6 – 10'

Width: 6 – 10'

Identification: Arrowwood Viburnum is an upright, rounded, multi-stemmed, deciduous shrub which typically matures to 6-10' tall with a similar spread, but may reach a height of 15' in optimum growing conditions. Non-fragrant white flowers appear in late spring.



White showy flowers attract birds and butterflies.

GROWING CONDITIONS

Native Habitat: Eastern North America (Zone: 2 to 8)

Water: Medium

Sun Light: Full sun to part shade

Easily grown in average, medium, well-drained soil in full sun to part shade. Prune immediately after flowering since flower buds form in summer for the following year.



Flowers give way to blue-black, berry-like drupes, which are quite attractive to birds and wildlife.

BENEFITS

Not highly ornamental, but exceedingly winter hardy, vigorous and reliable. Shrub borders. Tall hedge or screen. Background for native plantings.
